Shows an exceptionally high level of clarity, focus and cogency in communication at the current Level.

Grade Band A (A+, A, A-)

Clearly demonstrates a sophisticated, critical and thorough understanding of the topic. Provides evidence of independence of thought and clearly demonstrates the ability to develop a highly systematic and logical or insightful argument, solution or evaluation at the current Level. Demonstrates excellence in the appropriate use of the relevant literature, theory, methodologies, practices, tools, etc., to analyse and synthesise at the current Level. Shows a high level of clarity, focus and cogency in communication at the current Level.

Grade Band B (B+, B, B-)

Clearly demonstrates a well-developed, critical and comprehensive understanding of the topic. Provides some evidence of independence of thought and clearly demonstrates the ability to develop a systematic and logical or insightful argument, solution or evaluation at the current Level. Demonstrates a high degree of competence in the appropriate use of the relevant literature, theory, methodologies, practices, tools, etc., to analyse and synthesise at the current Level. Shows clarity, focus and cogency in communication at the current Level.

Grade Band C (C+, C, C-)

Demonstrates a systematic and substantial understanding of the topic. Demonstrates the ability to develop a systematic argument or solution at the current Level. Demonstrates a significant degree of competence in the appropriate use of the relevant literature, theory, methodologies, practices, tools, etc., to analyse and synthesise at the current Level. Provides evidence of clarity and focus in communication at the current Level.

Grade Band D (D+, D, D-)

Provides evidence of a systematic understanding of the key aspects of the topic. Demonstrates the ability to present a sufficiently structured argument or solution at the current Level. Demonstrates an acceptable degree of competence in the appropriate use of the relevant literature, theory, methodologies, practices, tools, etc., to analyse and synthesise at the current Level. Provides evidence of effective communication at the current Level.

Grade Band E (E+, E, E-)

Provides evidence of some understanding of key aspects of the topic and some ability to present an appropriate argument or solution at the current Level. Demonstrates some competence in the appropriate use of the relevant literature, theory, methodologies, practices, tools, etc at the current Level. Provides some evidence of effective communication at the current Level. However, there is also evidence of deficiencies which mean that the threshold standard (D-) has not been met.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

A transcript is issued to students at the end of each study level. If a student has completed his/her studies, the transcript will include details of any award made.

Credits and Levels

From 2009/10 entry, for undergraduate programmes students normally register for 120 credits of study and assessment block, at each study level.

From 2007/08 entry, postgraduate programmes of study normally consist of modules totalling 180 credits.

Level 0 is normally equivalent to the foundation year of an undergraduate degree programme.

Levels 1, 2 and 3 normally correspond to the 1st, 2nd and 3rd years of a full-time undergraduate degree. For students following other modes of study, there will not always be an equivalence between level and year of study.

Level 5 represents work normally associated with Masters level.

Minimum Grades

Programme specifications may define core assessments, for which particular minimum grades must be achieved for a given award.

Grade Descriptors

The prime reference for academic standards is the University's "Grade Descriptors", printed overleaf and available from the University website, for undergraduate and Masters level study.

Exemptions

Students may be exempt from certain block or modules, or from one or more study levels on the basis of previous experience or learning.

Training and Development Agency Basic Skills Tests

On successful completion of their programme of study and the Basic Skills Tests, students studying programmes in Education are recommended to the General Teaching Council (GTC) for Qualified Teacher Status (QTS). A grade of "I" against the relevant assessment block indicates that the student has not yet completed all three (numeracy, literacy and ICT) of the Basic Skills Tests.

Undergraduate Programmes with Placement Year

Students following programmes with a placement year will normally have undertaken one or more periods of workplace experience and learning, totalling an academic year, and contributing to the degree classification. Further details of the workplace experience are available from the University website.

Undergraduate Personal Development Planning

PDP involves practices such as raising self-awareness, planning for, and reviewing, personal/professional development. It is supported at programme and/or block level and/or through personal tutoring. Where this occurs at block level it is identified overleaf.

Date of Award

The date of the award, where applicable, is the date of the appropriate Examination Board's recommendation to the University Senate. The date printed on the certificate normally differs from that shown as the date of award on the transcript.

Validation

The transcript is not valid without the validating stamp and the signature of the Head of School or his/her nominee. An example of the validating stamp is shown below:


